Are Sydney's plants flowering earlier in the year than they did in the past? Are plants responding to anthropogenic climate change?

Once again, our speaker at the September meeting presented her material in a highly proficient manner and gave all the attendees confidence that much scientific research is in the hands of the very capable and dedicated.

Susan's research, while studying for her PhD, has been done with colleagues at UNSW and Mt Annan Botanic Gardens. With the global increase in CO₂ levels and the marked increase in temperatures many people worldwide are researching the effects on, and potential responses by, plants. In her research Susan was able to make comparisons between old seeds versus modern seeds and different geographical areas ranging between NSW, ACT, Victoria and Tasmania. Her hypothesis was *The areas with greatest climatic changes should see the greatest change in the plants*.



An amazing 2500 plants were propagated for the experiments and grown on for 6 months. Fifteen different traits were measured on these plants including germination rates, some chemical components and leaf sizes. While overseas studies in UK, USA and Canada and other countries have provided information about changes to reproductive timing, including flowering times, very little of this work has been done in Australia.

Susan has used data from 4 herbaria to obtain information on phenological characteristics such as timing of buds, flowers, leaves and fruits. The herbaria specimens also provide DNA and genetic data. Historic flowering time data has also been useful. Interestingly, this data was often collected for medical reasons to provide information about potential allergens. In 1963 there were 265 species (native & exotic plants) studied. With the support of the Val Williams Scholarship Susan was able to study 40 of the same species studied in 1963 in 3 local areas: Ku-ring-gai Chase NP, Lane Cove NP and Wallamutta Nature Reserve, Ryde. A diverse species sample was studied with a wide range of flowering habits. When sampled five states of development were noted: vegetative, budding, sporadic flowering (<25%), full flowering and fruiting.

After examining the field data and the herbaria material there were no statistically significant changes in flowering times between 1963 and 2018: some species were flowering earlier, some showed no change and some flowered later. Despite the confirmation that spring is occurring earlier (when measured by temperature and other changes) there is, at present, a lack of evidence of an advance in flowering time. Why? Possibly day length is more significant than temperature and other aspects (e.g. rainfall patternstimes and amount- may also impact the outcomes).

As with so many things, there are many more questions to be asked and answered. Some of these questions include

- Are pollinators responding more immediately to temperature changes? (one attendee commented that there is great variation between different species of bees to changes in temperature)
- What are the mechanisms for flowering time changes?
- Are responses due to evolutionary changes likely to take longer?

Susan is keen to continue researching and trying to help answer some of these very significant questions. APS NSG wishes her every success in the future.

Would you like to clone your favourite plants and create your own supply of plants???

Come on 11th October to our interactive propagation meeting.

Margaret Hamilton and Sue Bowen will share their knowledge and lead an interactive demonstration on how to propagate- both vegetative and seed methods.

'Goldilocks" samples are required- Please bring cuttings that are not too young and not too old, not too floppy and not too stiff. What is required is <u>firm new growth</u> in damp plastic bags, with preferably plant identified. Take a photo of plant if you can't ID it.



Do not bring flowering tips. Take a photo of the flower now if you require an identification.

Seeds and seedpods are suitable. If bringing Acacia or other Fabaceae seed pour near boiling water over them and leave for a few hours or overnight to cool, then drain and bag. If seeds from other genera - just bring as they are.

Please bring sharp secateurs.

Sue and Margaret will bring propagation mix, pots and punnets, Clonex rooting hormone gel, labels and pens.

For those people who are happy for others to do the propagating, **APS NSG propagated plants are available at all general meetings**. Please bring a bag or container to take them home in.

Carol Nolder 1931-2019

Carol was born in Harrow, Middlesex on the outskirts of London. When the WWII bombing raids began she and her younger siblings were sent to country Dorset. The war years shaped Carol's values — a lifetime of being thrifty, making do and helping others.

A Queen's Guide and a member of Young Farmers, Carol grew up with a love the countryside and a strong interest in horticulture.

Carol worked as a research chemist at Kodak laboratories and after marrying she settled in Chalfont St Giles in Buckinghamshire. She had two children and became a key figure in community groups. Skilled in craft and needlework, Carol was an apiarist, cultivated an extensive garden of vegetables and flowers and ran a small catering business. In the mid 1970s she joined the Scientific



Manufacturers Association organising large exhibitions 'behind the iron curtain' in Russia and East Germany, where she ran the catering team providing meals to delegates (no fast food outlets in those days!).

In 1995 Carol moved to Australia to be nearer to her daughter. She settled in Berowra and fell in love with the flora and fauna of the Australian bush. Looking for ways to become involved in her new community, she joined the APS and quickly became President. Carol loved organising meetings, speakers and events such as the display stand at Rosehill garden show. At APS Carol made many treasured friendships. Passionate about her battles with Hornsby Council as a member of the Hornsby Conservation Society, Carol also joined the Save Berowra action group (for which she went on her first and only protest march!). She contributed to efforts to save local bush areas from development and in 2002 saw first-hand the risk of bush fire that came within metres of her home.

The Wildflower Festival was one of Carol's favourite annual commitments. She would spend months sourcing pots, baskets and other items to stage the annual display. She organised several successful Australian plant identification courses and for many years was active in bushcare. She was also a volunteer for a number of years at Australian Walkabout Wildlife Sanctuary at Peats Ridge.

Carol was a person of few words, much preferring to be working behind the scenes. At APS Christmas parties she was most likely to be found in the kitchen organising the food, serving teas and coffees and doing the clearing up.

Carol was recognised on two occasions for her services to education and the community by Ku-ring-gai Council and also by Berowra Rotary.

Carol is survived by her son (in England), her daughter and two beloved grandchildren.

"Mum always gave more than she took. She was selfless and driven to do the right thing holding firm to a strong value set. She left a much smaller environmental footprint on this earth than many, but she helped and supported countless people along her journey and never asked anything for herself. She was a good person and is greatly missed by her family."
