President's Message



My newly planted, North Shore native garden is feeling the effects of winter but some plants have already started flowering.

The Leionema lamprofolium is covered in white flowers while my \$1

bargain *Hypocalymma angustifolium* is covered in pink flowers.

The Hypocalymma is one of the relatively few Western Australian shrubs that will grow in our humid east coast conditions in a well drained, sheltered position.

The Leionema occurs south of Rylstone and also likes a well drained position.

Both plants are worth trying if you want some winter flowers. The added benefit is that they provide food for the bees and other insects around in winter. I was amazed to see that several hover flies are



also enjoying the Hypocalymma and Leionema. Obviously, no-one has told them that it is winter!!!

It was great to see so many members at our last meeting. New members are invited to come to meetings to pick up their free plant tube and we often have a box of larger plants to give away to good homes. Members are also welcome to come to our Wednesday propagation afternoons to buy plants (cash only and weather permitting).

We are very privileged to have Dr. Alex Austin talk at our next meeting on Friday 4th August. Alex will cover the diversity of our solitary bee species, what we can expect to see in our local area, and show us how we can support them within the community. I am really looking forward to this talk!

Finally, please don't forget to come to the Berowra Woodchop on Sunday 27th August. You will have a wonderful day out, see some real wood-chopping and have the opportunity to buy some of our home-grown plants!

Gardening Responsibility



Presentation by Julia Rayment

at 14 July2023 meeting

Many thanks to Julia for a most informative and interactive presentation.

Julia's position is Project Officer (Weeds), Invasive Species Unit, Conservation Programs Branch, NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service.

Throughout Australia there is a significant problem with weeds. It is a **BIG** problem with very complex and costly consequences. Like all plants, weeds can impact on the environment, other plants, people and animals. 72% of weeds are estimated to have originated from accidental introductions of garden ornamental plants.

Currently there are 20 new plant naturalisations each year.

Gardening Responsibility is a voluntary scheme that aims to use the carrot rather than the stick approach and was launched in October 2022.

Purpose: To influence the commercial supply and demand of ornamental plants.

Why: To predict and prevent future landscape weeds

How: Identify plants with low invasive risk and provide choice.

Weeds are invasive plants and plants in the wrong place. Native plants can be weeds, just as much as exotics. Macquarie University have developed Factors of Invasiveness: see https://www.gardeningresponsibly.org.au/research/certify/

Considering that there are 30,000 ornamental plants (cultivated to be sold in a nursery) there is a mammoth task to identify the risks and communicate it to the suppliers and buyers.

Non commercial sellers e.g. stalls, private sales, group propagation need to consider what they are propagating and selling.

Some of the ways we can we help:

- Notify authorities and Gardening Responsibly if you find a "new" garden escapee.
- Minimise spread by pruning off seeds of plants.
- Think about our choices
- Look for the Gardening Responsibly logo on product

Group Walk for Saturday August 12th to Challenger Track, West Head area

Inspired by the good reports about the Challenger Walk from the Parramatta Hills Group and the Northern Beaches Group, who have done this walk in recent times, it's now North Shore's turn to go and see what is so good about this track!

A recce walk very recently showed that there are indeed very many colourful wildflowers to be seen on The Challenger Track. By the walk date, there will be even more as peak flowering time approaches. *Boronia serrulata*, the Native Rose, which we particularly love to see, is already starting to come into flower. Even if you attended this walk with one of the other two groups, you may like to come again this time, as a comparison of what's since started flowering.

The track is easy, almost flat, wide and short at 1.5km each way, ending with a nice view from a rocky lookout at the end that gives views up the Hawkesbury River to Brooklyn Railway bridge and across Cowan Creek and Broken Bay, including to Juno Point. There are 3-4 minor rises along the track and there is some loose rock rubble in a few places.

Afterwards, some may like to stay on for a picnic lunch at the Resolute Picnic Area, a short distance further up the road. We may even, if there is interest, do a very short, different walk from the picnic area to along the Koolewong Track which at only 800 metres long, ends at a wonderful viewing spot overlooking Broken Bay and Lion Island. It passes through a particularly big stand of lovely Wax Flowers- *Eriostemon australasius* and we will be checking the trunks of the grand Ironbark Gums to see the Ironbark orchids, which should be flowering by then.

Note that the West Head Lookout at the end of the road is inaccessible till later in the year due to improvement works. However the view from the end of the Koolewong Track is equally stunning.

When: Saturday 12th August 10am

Meeting Place: At the start of the Challenger Track, which is on the left along West Head Road and is 7.9 km from the Coal and Candle Creek Drive Junction. Park as safely as you can on the road edge where the wide road verge allows

What to bring: Water, hat, all weather gear if needed, water, snacks and lunch if staying on. Plant ID book and walking poles optional.


Bake in oven at 180° for 25 minutes. Wendy Grimm

Wallaby ignores Acacia spines in Coastal Upland Swamp Endangered Ecological Community, KWG Wendy Grimm

Pea plants are favoured by wallabies, but I didn't expect this swamp wallaby to carefully clutch the branches of Acacia ulicifolia to select the flowers for consumption. The shrub began with about a dozen pale yellow globular flower heads which were eaten by the wallaby within 16 seconds. No seeds will set on this wattle plant!

Report on Bobbin Head Walk on 15 July

We were lucky to have a fine day for this walk, a track which never disappoints. There are always floral surprises here!



Three rarer plants were encountered.

Darwinia biflora's distribution generally may be limited but in this locality we were happy to see very many specimens and they were in flower!

Melaleuca deanei, which we also saw, in contrast, rarely flowers.

A bit of a side bush bash by some of the group and some good location remembering by Wendy Grimm, led them to *Haloragodendron lucasii* plants.

Everyone loves finding orchids and we encountered two epiphytes- *Cymbidium suave* on a Bloodwood Gum and *Dockrillia linguiformis* (formerly *Dendrobium linguiforme*), the thumbnail or tongue orchid was growing on a rockface.

Other highlights included seeing the tail end of flowering of the five Banksia species encountered, some very impressive, very tall *Grevillea speciosa* shrubs, *Dodonaea pinnata*, the low growing hop bush with its hairy leaves, growing in sandstone cracks on the final descent to Bobbin Head. There were a fair few other plants in flower but also the promise of that soon getting even better with lots of flower buds on *Eriostemon australasius*, (Wax flowers), Boronias and others, even a Waratah or two.
