

Speaker: Daniel Bickel

Australian Museum Department of Entomology

Topic:



Abstract: Amber has fascinated people since prehistoric times and has long been traded from sources along the Baltic Sea. As well as being admired and used in jewellery, amber is of great scientific interest as it provides a clear window to past life. Being the hardened and fossilized resin of ancient trees, amber frequently contains inclusions of trapped animals and plants, where tiny insects and delicate floral structures can be seen in exquisite detail. Amber therefore is a great source of information about both the evolution and distribution of major biotic groups and past environments generally. Within the last 20 years, significant amber deposits have been discovered in Australia. These include (Miocene?) Cape York amber, washed up on remote beaches, and Paleogene deposits from Victoria and Tasmania. This talk will review the history, occurrence and study of amber.

A Q&A session after the presentation will give you an opportunity to ask all those questions you have about insects.

Meanwhile Jeff Howes has been visiting Canberra and visited the Australian National Botanic Gardens to see the new Banksia garden. "Stunning and worth a visit, despite record rainfall since opening in 2020. A lot of the plants are grafted and they not only used raised beds but plenty of sandstone walls to reflect the heat.

The most stunning plant was a deep purple knave coloured *Banksia robur*. Used to great effect."

Group Activity for 14th July Thursday to former Westleigh Sydney Water site.

This walk breaks with the tradition and is on a weekday, not a weekend.

The walk is to what is now referred to as Westleigh Park, a 36 hectare area purchased from Sydney Water by Hornsby Council and currently zoned as low density Residential or Public Recreation. About a third of it is degraded long grassed wasteland and the rest is very nice bushland. The Council's current Draft Plan Document proposes turning the grassed area into three large sports fields with associated car and bus roads access and parking and leaving the bush area as bush but with some worrying management issues.

The bush has stands of Sydney Turpentine Ironbark Forest (STIF) and Duffys Forest, both of which are Endangered Ecological Communities (the STIF critically endangered) as well as Bloodwood Scribbly Gum Woodland, Peppermint Angophora Forest and Scribbly Gum Open Woodland and at least 4 rare and endangered plants.

There are mountain bike tracks criss-crossing the bush, hence the choice of a much less busy week day when we are not likely to encounter bikes. These tracks have and continue to cause damage to the bush there. Hornsby Council's Draft Plans would see the number of bike trails reduced. See the plans at
