Congratulations to Wendy Grimm on being awarded the APS NSW Conservation Award 2022




All people interested in conservation, and especially the preservation of threatened species, can thank Wendy for all her tireless efforts. We also thank Phillip for his many contributions to APS NSG, both as an individual and in his unwavering support of Wendy in all her plant based endeavours.

Sue Fredrickson prepared the nomination on behalf of APS NSG. In summary, the nomination included the following points:

- Wendy can't walk past a plant that is new to her without needing to know what it is. She is very disciplined in looking it up either on the spot or later if necessary when she will not give up till her aim is achieved. Consequently, although a fit and good walker, walks with Wendy are anything but fast paced! She has an amazing ability to spot native orchids when the rest of us have walked on past them.
- Since rejoining in 2007, Wendy is and has been involved in many aspects of North Shore Group's activities. Many commented on the fact that Wendy is always so helpful to them and generous with her time.
- Committee member for at least 10 years, including secretary for 5 years.
- Hornsby Shire Herbarium since 2009 with research and weekly native plant surveys in the Hornsby Shire by a small group in APS.
- Plant propagation with APS NSG group and waratahs grown from seed at her home.
- Landcare, both on Hawkesbury River (Floating Landcare) and Marramarra National Park.
- Flower display at KWG. Wendy has helped with the collection and identification of specimens over many years. Wendy was instrumental in the planting of the rare local *Grevillea caylei* plant in KWG.
- The Knoll KWG. Wendy has been actively involved in the plant selection and maintenance of this display garden since 2007.
- Walks and Talks programme. Wendy works tirelessly, arranging the annual programme, organising every
 meeting, being a presenter and supporting new presenters. Despite the challenges of the past few years, the
 programme has continued in a modified format whenever health regulations permitted.
- FATS, Frog and Tadpole Society involvement since 1995 Vice President for several years and Secretary from 2003-2017. Wendy and Phillip have participated in a number of FATS activities over the years, including helping out at community day displays, frog workshops and the running of public meetings.
- Master of Philosophy at Macquarie University through the Dept of Biological Sciences was awarded to Wendy
 in April 2020. Thesis title was "The biology and ecology of *Genoplesium baueri* R. Br., an endangered
 terrestrial orchid endemic to New South Wales, Australia"
- Assisting Hugh Jones (APS NSG) with the monitoring / assessment of the endangered plant Haloragodendron lucasii.
- Wendy's and Phillip's home has a beautiful native garden.

Pruning demonstration by Phil Manton at The Knoll 15th May



Phil Manton commenced by showing a group of 11 people how to prune a privet-yes, you read correctly!! It was a very old specimen contained in a large pot. Our members would have been more radical!! The principles of pruning bonsai are very similar for all species, so we had to mentally transfer the lessons to other plants and non bonsai specimens. Phil then demonstrated on some larger cuttings of native plants how to prune. Important concepts included you can't put it back on. If in doubt, proceed in smaller steps and step back and gauge what the effect is as you proceed. Other things to consider are what you are aiming to achieve by pruning, what is the location and what is the aspect with respect to sun and shade and nearby plants. Jan's "lucky seat grevillea" from the May meeting was very one sided

plant. Phil suggested planting it with the less dense side facing north to help it to thicken up on that side. Hopefully a more balanced plant will result. It is now in situ and time will tell how it fares. Removing dead wood (if in doubt, scratch down to check on the status of the cambium layer) and branches that are crossing will help ventilation and promote plant health.

Phil then showed us how to sharpen our tools and very kindly sharpened several tools for people.

After lunch, the focus of activity moved to The Knoll, on the western edge of Lambert's Clearing. Seven members put their new-found knowledge into action: pruning unruly shrubs, trimming dead branches from acacias, baeckeas and lomatias, and reducing the rampant weeds smoothering the miniature grevillea and banksia in the front bed. Phil stayed on to demonstrate pruning of the lanky *Grevillea speciosa* growing out of control next to *Banksia robur*.

The unseasonal conditions made working rather difficult- boggy in grassy areas and slippery on the sandstone surfaces. Fortunately, everyone took

care and no-one was injured, and the slightly sore backs and leeches were regarded as worth enduring to spruce-up our demonstration garden on The Knoll. Hopefully Michael will approve of the results when he sees the changes.

Benefits of Bushcare - How volunteering and connecting with nature can improve your health and wellbeing



It was good to be able to have a face to face meeting on 13th May where we able to again check out the library and plants for sale. Leanne Johnston gave a very comprehensive talk on bushcare in Hornsby Shire. Leanne is the Environmental Scientist - bushcare and has worked at Hornsby Shire Council (HSC) for 14 years. The talk was very well received and stimulated many questions and much discussion.

The Hornsby Bushcare Program officially began in 1989 with 6 groups and remains one of the most successful programs in the Sydney basin. HSC now has 65 active groups where each group is supported by Council with a qualified and experienced Bushcare supervisor to lead and inspire the volunteers. There are currently about 350 volunteers who work once a month for 3 hours. Volunteers tend to prefer to work at the one site. Pre 2020 these volunteers clocked up about 17,000 hours per year.

What are some of the benefits to the community and the volunteers?

- Improvement of the local environment- both its amenity and biodiversity
- Feeling as though you are making a difference & contributing to the community and local bushland and helping to negate man induced climate change
- Forming new acquaintances and friendships
- Being outside and enjoying nature, flora and fauna, and the fresh air.

HSC bushcare volunteers do not have to live in the area. Our waterways from creeks to the ocean also benefit from improved land management.

Social events, such as guided bushwalks, plant ID workshops, photo competition and exhibition, and training opportunities are part of the programme. What is required of the volunteers? Curiosity and interest, good mobility and suitable physical fitness.

Several APS NSG have volunteered with bushcare and landcare and contributed MANY hours. Barry Lees commented that over the years the public's mindset seems to have changed with people being more appreciative of the natural environment and less likely to be dumping rubbish in bushland. (Ed.: *That is such good news.*)

GROUP WALK on Saturday 18th June to DANGAR ISLAND, Hawkesbury River.

Wet weather cancelled this outing in April so we are going to try again.

We last went to Dangar Island as a group about 11 years ago. There is much of interest there for a group such as ours. It is a relaxed day to a beautiful place with a short ferry trip from Brooklyn. There are remnants of bush, nice river views and some magnificent tall Blackbutts, even in the developed parts. There is a lot of interesting history relating to the island including Aboriginal, World War 2 and development along the Hawkesbury River, such as the construction of the bridges crossing the river. Local residents have worked hard to protect and regenerate bush areas.

There is a good café on the island beside the ferry wharf and Brooklyn has a good selection of eateries and hotel, if you wanted to make a longer day of it after returning to the mainland from the island. We will bring our own picnic lunches however, as this will give us flexibility to decide on a nice place and good time to have lunch.

The island is not big, so distances covered walking are not too arduous and we'll be walking at a leisurely pace.

Travel to Brooklyn can be by car or train (Hawkesbury River Station).

Date: Saturday 18th June

Time: Meet at the Dangar Island Ferry wharf for the 10 am Ferry. Ferry departure time is 10.00am

The wharf is right next to the railway track near the north east end of the platform. If coming by train, the 9.26am from Hornsby will get you to Hawkesbury River station at 9.49am, giving you 11 minutes to get to the nearby Dangar Island ferry wharf. Catch the earlier train (an hour earlier) if you don't feel confident to find and make the 10am ferry (or drive).

At the end of the day we'll most likely leave the island by ferry at 2.45pm the next one being an hour later.

Be aware that there is a 45 minute wait for a southbound train as the ferries don't co-ordinate with the trains (stroll at Brooklyn or coffee opportunity?)

What to bring

Hat, sunscreen, walking shoes, lunch, coffee keep-cup, snacks and drinks and hand sanitizer.

Ferry fare is \$9.30 each way, \$4.70 for pensioners and kids. Most likely payment will be by card but have some cash just in case. Masks are compulsory on public transport and the ferry.

Australia has a wealth of unique plant species, with many plants found nowhere else in the world. To protect these plants we need to know what is happening on the ground, and how plants across Australia are faring against threats such as habitat loss, disease, fires and floods. Citizen scientists, bushwalkers and botany groups have on-ground knowledge of what's happening to plants in their area. A new citizen science project, Flora Connections wants to connect this community plant knowledge to conservation

decision making. Flora Connections provides guides and a data sheet to collect information on plant species- where the plant is growing, how many plants there are and what the threats to the plant might be. Data can then be uploaded via the website to the Atlas of Living Australia, where it will be used by the scientific committees and land managers trying to protect plants across Australia.
