We had a lot of stock, sold much of it, but still have a number of good buys left for those who would like to buy some advanced plants as Christmas gifts. see below


We have held our election for Committee members and filled most of the positions for 2022. My thanks to everyone who has served during this difficult year and to those who will be taking up positions or continuing during next year.

Jonathan Lidbetter's talk Growing Natives Commercially at East Coast Wildflowers

Craig Scott, owner of East Coast Wildflowers, has been growing natives commercially for 35 years and he and his team are passionate about their enterprise. Jonathan is one of the farm managers there with from many years of varied experience in horticulture.

Plants from 23 families, 75 genera and 120 species are grown with 75% of wholesale production being Australian natives. Some South African protea are also grown. Sometimes flowers and/ or foliage are sourced from other suppliers when conditions at Mangrove Mountain NSW aren't suitable for growing them.

Jonathan commented that in many ways the growing is the easier part, while harvesting and selling are the more complex and challenging aspects of the business. Certainly being able to work in the wee small hours is an essential component of the business. APS NSG has bought flowers from them for the 2018/2019 Festival and Sue F. and I have enjoyed the buzz and activities at the Homebush markets at the relatively late time of 6am.

The foci of the business are flowers, foliage, fruit and nuts. Natives can be harvested for 33-52 weeks of the year, dependent on the plant. They often have a more limited time window compared with many exotic plants.

Challenges to growing include weather, fire and smoke damage, pests (caterpillars, mites, rats chewing irrigation pipes, deer), diseases such as Myrtle rust, moulds and viruses. The logistics of the business involve transporting people, machinery and vegetative material around, meaning that protocols have to be well designed and followed.

The source of the plants grown varies from own propagation to supplied by other commercial growers. Propagation methods include trials of seeds, cuttings, grafting and tissue culture.

There is a highly regulated and enforced system for obtaining and using a licence to pick native flowers in the wild.

Popular crops include 30 varieties of Kangaroo paws (Anigozanthos) which vary in colour and height. These are picked all year round, while many of the native daisy species have a short harvesting period. To extend their sales availability they are air dried up side down. Flannel flowers are grown in pots under cover to maximise their quality and more readily control the environment. A range of Ptilotus are grown.

Plants used as sources of foliage include banksia, wattle and gums. Some of the spectacular WA gums are sourced from growers in western NSW, where the drier climes suit the plants.

Challenges include growing species that are in demand e.g. blandfordia (Christmas bells) and Sturt Desert Pea, but difficult to grow.

Jonathan showed us some images of big events which have been supplied with large numbers of floral arrangements- fashion shows and corporate events (including virtual ones nowadays). The business conducts farm tours, floristry workshops and supports Ovarian Cancer research.

A lively Q&A session followed this informative and most interesting presentation. Thanks Jonathan & East Coast Wildflowers for sharing your time, knowledge and experience with us.
